## British Values









### Democracy

Children are provided with opportunities to develop their self-confidence and self-awareness.

Children make choices and decisions about what they want to explore and learn, and how they're going to use the resources made accessible to them.

Adults model and support turn taking, sharing, collaboration and making decisions together.

Each Reception class votes for one
School Council representative who meets
with the School Council regularly to have
their voice heard.

Each Reception class votes for two Eco Team representatives who meet with the Eco Team regularly.

Children cast votes as part of many daily routines, such as voting for which story they would like at storytime.

## Individual Liberty

Children are provided with opportunities to develop their self-confidence and self-awareness.

Children develop a positive sense of themselves.

Children develop an understanding that
we are all free to have different
opinions and beliefs.

Children are encouraged to make independent choices and to take risks, such as balancing on obstacle courses and using tools.

# Mutual Respect and Tolerence

Children learn how to be part of the school and class community.

Adults model and support children to develop positive relationships with other people.

Adults demonstrate and actively promote an ethos of inclusivity and tolerance where views, faiths, cultures and races are valued, respected and celebrated.

Children explore and celebrate the similarities and differences between themselves and others.

Children practice tolerance and challenge stereotypes through, for example, sharing stories that reflect and value the diversity of children's experiences and by accessing resources and activities that challenge gender, cultural and racial stereotyping.

## Rule of Law

Children learn to manage their own feelings and behaviour.

Children learn right from wrong and adults model and support making the right choices.

Children learn how to behave within agreed and clearly defined boundaries, such as the school rules and classroom expectations.

Children learn about consequences.
